Her story is long but she was taken to Pima Animal Care and Control (PACC) for treatment. She was then released to Ruff Rescue for rehabilitation in a loving foster home. While this was all happening, a SaddleBrooke Pet Rescue Network volunteer had been helping Paul Fuchs and Cathy Handrigan look for a new dog. They had lost their beloved Khloe about a year ago and decided it was time to give another rescue a chance at being a privileged SB dog. Many hours were spent surfing the web to no avail.

Then the unexpected happened, they heard about Missy, who had been through so much and was still scheduled for more surgery and dental extractions. They decided that they wanted to meet her as soon as possible with the hope that it would be a perfect match. This sweet, resilient Lhasa Apso-Terrier mix immediately stole their hearts.

At the meet and greet session, still healing from her wounds, she wiggled her way over to them with her tail wagging and her under bite smiling.

The dye was cast; it was love at first sight. Missy, now known as Princess, was officially adopted on June 4, 2025.

Cathy and Paul report that she follows them from room to room wagging her tail and that she also sleeps with them at night.

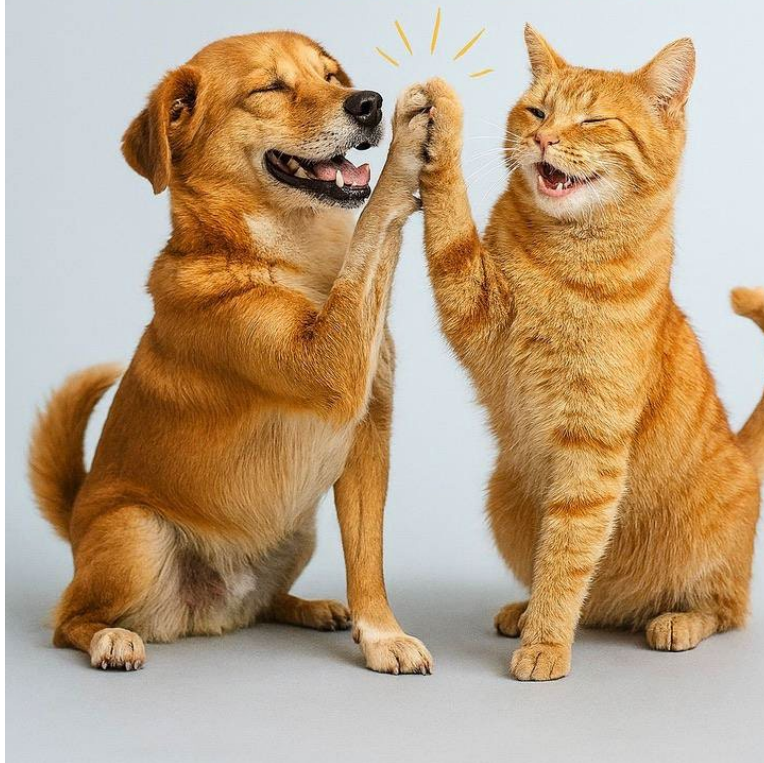
A rescue dog knows they have been saved and rewards you tenfold with love and devotion every day.

The Importance of Microchipping Your Pets

Microchipping pets is a crucial step in responsible pet ownership, offering permanent identification that dramatically increases the chances of being reunited with a lost animal.

Benefits of Microchipping include:

- Permanent, tamper-proof identification – collars and tags can fall off or be removed.
- Increased reunion rates – 72% of lost microchipped pets are reunited with their families.
- Deterrence of theft- provides indisputable proof of ownership.
- International travel compliance- many countries require microchipping for pets entering their borders.



- Minimal discomfort and maintenance- procedure is similar to a vaccination and lasts for the pet's lifetime.
- Typical cost - \$25 - \$100, registered with national database
- Critical to keep your contact information updated in the database. Make this a priority if you move, change your name or acquire a new phone number.

In summary, microchipping is a cost-effective, safe, and reliable way to protect your pet and give you peace of mind.

Because Love Never Ends: Ensuring your pet's tomorrow

Having a succession plan for your pets is essential to secure their well-being in case of your incapacity, relocation, or passing. Pets are cherished family members, and preparing for their future care is a responsible decision that ensures they receive the love and attention they deserve.

A succession plan outlines who will care for your pets and how their needs will be met if you are unable to do so. This plan prevents your pets from facing uncertainty or distress by ensuring they remain in a loving and familiar environment, maintaining their quality of life and preserving your bond with them. It would be heartbreaking for a family pet to end up frightened in a shelter, highlighting the importance of a well-thought-out succession plan.

Creating a succession plan involves specific steps to guarantee your pets' care in your absence:

1) ***Pet Trust****: Establish a legal pet trust to allocate funds and care instructions for your pet's well-being. Designate a trustworthy caregiver or sanctuary, such as Hearts that Purr or Hermitage for felines. For canines, explore options provided by Old Souls or the

Arizona Humane Society's Continuing Care Program. Contact these organizations for more information on cost and enrollment.

- 2) ****Funding****: Allocate funds in the pet trust to cover your pet's expenses, managed by a trustee appointed in the document.
- 3) ****Legal Documentation****: Work with an estate planning attorney to create a legally binding document that complies with state laws regarding pet trusts.
- 4) ****Regular Updates****: Review and update the pet trust as needed to reflect changes in care requirements or circumstances.
- 5) ****Emergency Contact Information****: Provide essential contact details for caregivers, veterinarians, and others in case of emergencies.
- 6) ****Inform Family and Friends****: Communicate your plan with loved ones and caregivers to ensure everyone understands their roles.

By documenting your wishes through a pet trust or other legal means, you can ensure your pets' ongoing care, even in unexpected situations. Taking these steps provides peace of mind and security for your beloved pets' future well-being.

Therapy Dogs verses Service Dogs

Do you know the difference?

Therapy dogs and service dogs serve different roles and have distinct functions:

Therapy Dogs

Therapy dogs are trained to provide comfort, affection, and emotional support to people in various settings, such as hospitals, nursing homes, schools, and disaster relief situations.

Their primary role is to interact with individuals to improve their emotional well-being, reduce stress, and provide companionship. Therapy dogs are not granted the same legal rights and access privileges as service dogs and are typically not allowed in places where pets are restricted unless invited for a specific therapy visit.

Service Dogs

Service dogs are trained to perform specific tasks to assist individuals with disabilities or medical conditions, such as guiding individuals who are blind, alerting to seizures, or providing mobility assistance.

Service dogs are protected under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and have legal rights to accompany their handlers in public places, including restaurants, stores, and public transportation.

Service dogs undergo specialized training tailored to the individual needs of their handlers and are considered working animals rather than pets.

In summary, therapy dogs offer emotional support and comfort to individuals in various settings, while service dogs are trained to perform specific tasks to assist individuals with disabilities.

Service dogs have legal rights and access privileges under the ADA, whereas therapy dogs do not have the same legal status and are not granted public access rights.

SaddleBrooke Pet Rescue Network became responsible for his care while being fostered. He was named Curly and is approximately two years old and a bundle of love and joy.



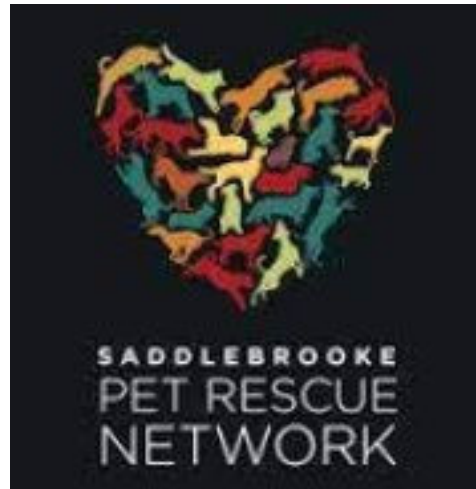
Unfortunately, his owners were never found after searching for almost two months.

DO YOU LET YOUR DOG OUT WITHOUT A LEASH?

Allowing dogs to roam without a leash in the desert can pose significant dangers due to the presence of various wildlife such as coyotes, bobcats, owls, and rattlesnakes. These animals are natural predators and may see

unleashed dogs as potential prey, leading to potential confrontations that can result in injury or even death for the dog.

Coyotes, known for their cunning and hunting skills, can easily overpower a dog that is not restrained. Bobcats, although generally shy and elusive, may become aggressive if they feel threatened or if they perceive a dog as competition for resources.

Owls, particularly larger species like great horned owls, are known to attack small animals, including dogs, especially during the night when they are more active.

Additionally, rattlesnakes, common in desert environments, pose a serious threat to dogs due to their venomous bites.

Using long leads on dogs in the desert also comes with its own set of risks. A long lead may become tangled in vegetation or rocks, leading to potential injuries or trapping the dog in a precarious situation. In addition, a dog on a long lead may have more freedom to wander into areas where wildlife is present, increasing the likelihood of encounters with predators.

Furthermore, a dog on a long lead may be more difficult to control in emergency situations, such as encountering a dangerous animal or navigating challenging terrain.

Long leads on dogs can inadvertently attract wild animals, viewing them as potential prey due to increased mobility and proximity, almost like saying 'come and get me,' posing a risk to both the dog and the wildlife.

To ensure the safety of both dogs and wildlife in the desert environment, it is crucial for dog owners to always keep their pets on a secure leash when venturing outdoors. Even if the owner is standing by, such as when letting the dog out back just for a quick pee, it is still important to keep the dog on a leash to prevent potential confrontations with wildlife and to ensure their safety in the desert environment. This not only protects the dog from potential harm but also helps to preserve the delicate balance of the

ecosystem by minimizing conflicts between domestic animals and native wildlife.

By being responsible pet owners and respecting the natural environment, we can help prevent unnecessary harm and promote harmony between all creatures that call the desert home.
